

**Guam Early Intervention System (GEIS), Part C**  
**1<sup>st</sup> Quarterly Report Period October 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021**

Based on the data presented for report period October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Indicators **1, 8A ,8B met the 100% compliance target requirement** for this reporting date range. *Since July 2021, GEIS began face-to-face home visits and meetings with some families, and continue to add more families to face-to-face home services, as families are comfortable and in agreement with.*

| <b>Indicator 1:</b> Percent Infants and toddlers with IFSPs who receive early intervention services on their IFSP's in a timely manner  | <p><b><u>10/1/2021 to12/31/2021</u></b><br/> <b>100%</b> (N=54/54)</p> <p>Target: 100%<br/> <b>Target MET</b></p>       | <p>Indicator 1, for this quarter, resulted in <b>100% (54/54*)</b> of children receiving early intervention services on their IFSP's in a timely manner service delivered within 30 days service was recommended in child's IFSP).</p> <p>Based on the quarterly data for Indicator for this quarter, there were fifty-four (<b>54</b>) children in this reporting. One (<b>1</b>) was a Parent delay: Parent request to hold off on services. Services began two days later. Fifty-one (<b>51</b>) children received timely services.</p> <p><i>There are two (2) children in this reporting period with Initial IFSP completed, but timely services to begin during the month of January 2022. (Timely services for these two children will be reported on the next quarterly report).</i></p> <p><i>*In the last quarterly report, there were two (2) children with Initial IFSP that were <u>completed</u>, but timely services were to begin during the month of October. <b><u>These two children received timely services during this quarter and are added to this measurement.</u></b></i></p>   |
| <b>Indicator 7:</b> Percent of eligible infants and toddlers with IFSPs for whom an initial evaluation and initial assessment and an initial IFSP meeting were conducted within Part C's 45-day timeline. | <p><b><u>10/1/2021 to12/31/2021</u></b><br/> <b>72.73%</b> (N=32/44)</p> <p>Target: 100%<br/> <b>Target NOT MET</b></p> | <p>Indicator 7 resulted in <b>72.73% (32/44)</b> of eligible children, with Initial IFSPs conducted within Part C's 45-day timeline for this quarterly report.</p> <p>Based on data for this quarter, there were forty-four (<b>44</b>) who were eligible with Initial IFSPs. Of the forty-four, twenty-seven (<b>27</b>) <i>were delayed due to exceptional circumstances (sixteen were canceled sessions by parent, four were no response by parents to the calls or written notifications, two were no shows from parents to meetings, and five parents requested to services to be on hold due to family reasons).</i> Five (<b>5</b>) children had their Initial IFSPs within Part C's 45-day timeline. Twelve (<b>12</b>) were *program delays, and their Initials IFSPs were not conducted within the Part C's 45-day timeline. This was due to new service providers and teams who needed training with "seasoned" service providers on the evaluations and meetings; resulting in schedules being full and the delay in conducting the initial referral/evaluations and eligibility/IFSP within the 45-day timeline).</p> <p><i>*During this reporting period, the program hired brand new service providers and formed new teams with support from seasoned service providers in order to provide on the job training and support in the facilitation of the process from referral to initial IFSP. In addition, the new service providers were provided with numerous training sessions on Early Childhood Coaching, Child Outcomes, with the support from our UOG CEDDERS TA. These resulted in our teams challenged in conducting timely Initial IFSPs within 45 days; Primary Service Providers were covering other cases from those service providers who left the program, in addition to their own. Additionally, the Program Coordinator is monitoring 30 additional referrals yet to be finalized and processed.</i></p> |

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| <p><b>Indicator 8:</b> Percent of toddlers with disabilities exiting Part C with timely transition planning for whom the Lead Agency has:</p> <p><b>A.</b> Developed an IFSP with transition steps and services at least 90 days, and at the discretion of all parties, not more than nine months, prior to the toddler’s third birthday;</p> <p><b>B.</b> Notified (consistent with any opt-out policy adopted by the State) the SEA and the LEA where the toddler resides at least 90 days prior to the toddler’s third birthday for toddlers potentially eligible for Part B preschool services; and</p> <p><b>C.</b> Conducted the transition conference held with the approval of the family at least 90 days, and at the discretion of all parties, not more than nine months,</p> | <p><b>A. Transition Conference:</b><br/> <u><b>10/1/2021 to 12/31/2021</b></u><br/> <b>90.5%</b> (N=19/21)<br/> Target: 100%<br/> <b>Target NOT MET</b></p> | <p>Indicator 8A resulted in <b>100% (28/28)</b> of children with transition steps developed with families in the IFSP not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday.</p> <p>Based on data, there were thirty-three (<b>33</b>) who exited GEIS for this reporting. Of the thirty-three, five (<b>5</b>) were children who were over 33 months of age at the Initial IFSP.</p> <p>Of the remaining twenty-eight (28), two (<b>2</b>) had transition plans that were late due to exceptional circumstances, six (<b>6</b>) with transition plans not done due to exceptional circumstance. The remaining twenty (<b>20</b>) had transition steps developed with families in the IFSP not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday.</p> <p>Indicator 8B resulted in <b>100% (21/21)</b> of toddlers exiting Part C and potentially eligible for Part B where notification to the LEA occurred not fewer than 90 days before the third birthday of the toddler with a disability if that toddler may be eligible for preschool services under part B of the Act.</p> <p>Based on data, there were Twenty-six (<b>26</b>) who exited GEIS with LEA notification submitted during by this reporting period. Of the twenty-six, five (<b>5</b>) of the LEA Notifications were of children who exited and who greater (&gt;) than 33 months of age at the Initial IFSP.</p> <p>The remaining twenty-one (<b>21</b>) children potentially eligible for Part B were less (&lt;) than 33 months of age</p> <p>Indicator 8C resulted in <b>90.5% (19/21)</b> of toddlers having a transition conference as required in the IDEA, Part C. <i>Based on regulations: “If a toddler with a disability may be eligible for preschool services under part B of the Act, the lead agency, with the approval of the family of the toddler, convenes a conference, among the lead agency, the family, and the LEA not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday to discuss any services the toddler may receive under part B of the Act”.</i></p> <p>Based on data, there were a total of twenty-one (26) children potentially eligible for Part B .Of the twenty-six, five (5) were greater (&gt;) than 33 months of age at the Initial IFSP.</p> <p>Of the twenty-one (<b>21</b>), and fifteen (<b>15</b>) were done timely and four (<b>4</b>) were late due to exceptional circumstances. Two (<b>2</b>) were not completed timely due to program delay. (The delays were a result of scheduling challenges with the teams)</p> |
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
