

**Guam Early Intervention System (GEIS), Part C**  
**2<sup>nd</sup> Quarterly Report Period January 1, 2022 to March 31, 2022**

Based on the data presented for report period January 1, 2022 through March 31, 2022. Indicators **1, 8A & 8B met the 100% compliance target requirement** for this reporting date range.

<b>Indicator 1:</b> Percent Infants and toddlers with IFSPs who receive early intervention services on their IFSP's in a timely manner	<p><u><b>1/1/2022 to 3/31/2022</b></u>  <b>100%</b> (N=42/42)</p> <p>Target: 100%  <b>Target MET</b></p>	<p>Indicator 1, for this quarter, resulted in <b>100% (42/42)</b> of children receiving early intervention services on their IFSP's in a timely manner service delivered within 30 days service was recommended in child's IFSP).</p> <p>Based on the quarterly data for Indicator for this quarter, there were forty-nine (<b>49</b>) children in this reporting.  Of these, <i>nine (9) children in this reporting period with Initial IFSP completed, but timely services to begin during the month of April 2022. (Timely services for these nine children will be reported on the next quarterly report).</i>  Of the forty (<b>40</b>), four (4) were exceptional circumstances: one (1) Parent request to hold off on services, and the other three (3) cancelled scheduled meeting. There were thirty-six (36) received timely services.  In addition, from the last quarterly reporting, there were two (<b>2</b>) children with Initial IFSP that were <u>completed</u>, but timely services were to begin during the month of January. These two children received timely services during this quarter and are added to this measurement</p>
<b>Indicator 7:</b> Percent of eligible infants and toddlers with IFSPs for whom an initial evaluation and initial assessment and an initial IFSP meeting were conducted within Part C's 45-day timeline.	<p><u><b>1/1/2022 to 3/31/2022</b></u>  <b>63.64%</b> (N=21/33)</p> <p>Target: 100%  <b>Target NOT MET</b></p>	<p>Indicator 7 resulted in <b>63.63%</b> of eligible children, with Initial IFSPs conducted within Part C's 45-day timeline for this quarterly report.</p> <p>Based on data for this quarter, there were Thirty-three (<b>33</b>) who were eligible with Initial IFSPs.  Of the thirty-three, fourteen (<b>14</b>) <i>were delayed due to exceptional circumstances (nine were canceled sessions by parent, three were no response by parents to the calls or written notifications, one was a no shows from parents to meetings, one parent requested to services to be on hold due to family reasons).</i>  Seven (<b>7</b>) children had their Initial IFSPs within Part C's 45-day timeline.  Twelve (<b>12</b>) were *program delays, and their Initials IFSPs were not conducted within the Part C's 45-day timeline. *This was due to new service providers and teams who needed training with "seasoned" service providers on the evaluations and meetings; resulting in schedules being full and the delay in conducting the initial referral/evaluations and eligibility/IFSP within the 45-day timeline).  <i>*The program continues to support brand new service providers with support from seasoned service providers in order to provide on the job training and support in the facilitation of the process from referral to initial IFSP.</i>  <i>Six of the 10 service providers are new to the program for FFY2021-2022. There are monthly training sessions on Early Childhood Coaching, Child Outcomes, and developing appropriate IFSPs with the support from our UOG CEDDERS TA. These resulted in our teams challenged in conducting timely Initial IFSPs within 45 days; Primary Service Providers were covering other cases from those service providers who left the program, in addition to their own.</i></p>

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<p><b>Indicator 8:</b> Percent of toddlers with disabilities exiting Part C with timely transition planning for whom the Lead Agency has:</p> <p><b>A.</b> Developed an IFSP with transition steps and services at least 90 days, and at the discretion of all parties, not more than nine months, prior to the toddler’s third birthday;</p> <p><b>B.</b> Notified (consistent with any opt-out policy adopted by the State) the SEA and the LEA where the toddler resides at least 90 days prior to the toddler’s third birthday for toddlers potentially eligible for Part B preschool services; and</p> <p><b>C.</b> Conducted the transition conference held with the approval of the family at least 90 days, and at the discretion of all parties, not more than nine months,</p>	<p><b>A. Transition Plan:</b>  <u><b>7/1/2021 to 3/31/2022</b></u>  <b>100%</b> (N=28/28)  Target: 100%  <b>Target MET</b></p> <p><b>B. Notification to LEA:</b>  <u><b>7/1/2021 to 3/31/2022</b></u>  100% (N=29/29)  Target: 100%  <b>Target MET</b></p> <p><b>C. Transition Conference:</b>  <u><b>7/1/2021 to 3/31/2022</b></u>  <b>93.10%</b> (N=27/29)  Target: 100%  <b>Target NOT MET</b></p>	<p>Indicator 8A resulted in <b>100% (28/28)</b> of children with transition steps developed with families in the IFSP not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday.</p> <p>Based on data, there were forty-seven (<b>47</b>) children were at transition age. Of the forty-seven, seven (<b>7</b>) were children who were over 33 months of age at the Initial IFSP.</p> <p>Of the remaining forty, three (<b>3</b>) had transition plans that were late due to exceptional circumstances, eight (<b>8</b>) with transition plans not done due to exceptional circumstance.</p> <p>The remaining twenty-eight (<b>28</b>) had transition steps developed with families in the IFSP not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday.</p> <p>Indicator 8B resulted in <b>100% (29/29)</b> of toddlers exiting Part C and potentially eligible for Part B where notification to the LEA occurred not fewer than 90 days before the third birthday of the toddler with a disability if that toddler may be eligible for preschool services under part B of the Act.</p> <p>Based on data, there were thirty-six (<b>36</b>) who exited GEIS with LEA notification submitted during by this reporting period. Of the thirty-six, seven (<b>7</b>) of the LEA Notifications were of children who exited and who greater (&gt;) than 33 months of age at the Initial IFSP.</p> <p>The remaining twenty-nine (<b>29</b>) children potentially eligible for Part B were less (&lt;) than 33 months of age</p> <p>Indicator 8C resulted in <b>93.10% (27/29)</b> of toddlers having a transition conference as required in the IDEA, Part C. <i>Based on regulations: “If a toddler with a disability may be eligible for preschool services under part B of the Act, the lead agency, with the approval of the family of the toddler, convenes a conference, among the lead agency, the family, and the LEA not fewer than 90 days—and, at the discretion of all parties, not more than 9 months—before the toddler’s third birthday to discuss any services the toddler may receive under part B of the Act”.</i></p> <p><i>Based on the data, there thirty-six with LEA submitted to Part B. Of these, seven (7) were children whose age were greater than 33 month of age.</i></p> <p><i>Of the remaining twenty-nine (29), Eighteen (18) had timely transition conferences, nine (9) received a transition conference late due to Parent Delays, and two (2) program delays (The delays were a result of scheduling challenges with the teams).</i></p>
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
