Expulsion Criteria when Recommending Expulsion for School Administrators

Guam Department of Education (Revised 6/14/24)

Expulsion is the most serious action a school can pursue to address student discipline. School administrators need to weigh the rights of the student to receive a public education with the overall safety to the individual and entire school community. When recommending expulsion, the following criteria is to guide you in preparing the justification for expulsion to the DSESCL. School administrators need to initial each box, provide written statements as required in the criteria, attach the *Rubric for Expulsion* and all supporting documents, and email to DSESCL and SSSD Administrator.
