The Guam Department of Education's Striving Readers - Read, Lead & Succeed Program closed out its Fiscal Year 2017 program plan on March 2021. Despite the changes in key personnel throughout the entire grant performance period, the project was able to carry out the grant's goals and objectives accordingly.

The Project Director continuously monitored and managed the SRCL Program activities throughout the year and focused on ensuring that both the professional development on the use of the technology and the access to the technology equipment and resources are procured and distributed to all the SRCL Teachers.

In November 2018, the SRCL Program facilitated a Google Classroom Training for the SRCL Teachers to ensure that they are equipped with the available web-based literacy programs for classroom instruction. Additionally, the SRCL Teachers submit on a quarterly basis, their "Best Practices" lesson plans specific to reading and language arts. These lesson plans were compiled and shared with all SRCL Teachers as a Literacy Toolkit.

During the Summer of 2019, a series of Integrating Art into Literacy was facilitated and attended by all the Prekindergarten teachers along with several of the elementary SRCL Teachers. The training allowed for teachers to use art and increase literacy skills through the use of children's literature books. During this reporting period, the 210 Chromebooks, 113 headphones and five (5) access points and fourteen (14) mobile laptop carts have been distributed to all secondary SRCL Schools and participating teachers. As of October 2019, the additional 189 Spin 5 laptops and 302 headphones were distributed to the SRCL Elementary Schools and teachers along with mobile carts and access points. Additionally, the project funded teachers and administrators to attend various conferences and workshop in the mainland to enhance knowledge with the intent to share and apply those learning in the classroom. The district views these opportunities as capacity building to improve literacy achievement scores among the students.

Due to some unforeseen challenges with the expending of grant funds, SRCL personnel requested its first No-Cost Extension in August 2019. The no-cost extension request was approved along with a modification of the budget to shift funds into technology equipment to provide additional support to augment what has already been purchased for the classrooms.

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During the Fall of 2019, the Literacy Committee Members met to address the literacy plan for the next five years. The intent was to assist with the direction in establishing a district-wide effort to improve literacy beyond the SRCL classrooms. The SRCL Program planned to update the Literacy Plan and

present it to the Joint Board Union Curriculum Textbook Committee for their review and approval, and thereafter present the approved Literacy Plan to the Guam Education Board in January 2020. The plan did not materialize due to the school closure prompted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

In the Summer of 2020, SRCL personnel submitted a second request of No-Cost Time Extension to be able to complete activities as described in the prior extension request in August 2019. With the approval of this extension, personnel were able to move forward with the procurement of professional development contractual services on comprehensive literacy strategies on oral language, reading, and writing for Pre-K through 10th grade teachers. Additionally, more technology supplies such as headphones for each SRCL participating student for use in the classroom when engaging in online literacy resources.

The beginning of SY2020-2021 began with significant challenges. Schools were shut down immediately upon the opening of the school year and the district implemented two models of remote learning to address immediate learning loss: online and hard-copy instruction models of learning. Both models faced a myriad of challenges – lack of devices and quality instruction. The district began the distribution of technology devices for students who had reliable internet connectivity at home. With the support and re-purposing of SRCL funded technology devices, students were able to check-out these devices to continue remote learning.

During the school-closure, the district worked through ways to ensure that teachers too evaded extreme learning loss. Participating teachers attended various professional learning opportunities to address the use of technology to deliver instructions remotely, promote effective literacy with special population groups such as ESL, and unpacking literacy using non-fiction text. These professional learning opportunities were conducted synchronously to provide all participating teachers the collaboration feel that has been taken away by the Covid-19 pandemic.

While remote learning continued across the district, project personnel worked to procure resources to help mitigate learning loss in literacy. The project initiated the procurement process for the continuity of the Achieve3000 reading program, procured literacy take-home backpacks through Teacher Created Materials for every participating SRCL students to ensure literacy continues at the home, and procured contractual services to continue professional learning for participating teachers to enhance literacy skills and the evaluation of external and internal assessments.

To date, the Guam SRCL Program has expended all of its funds and continues to collaborate with stakeholders on best practices to improve literacy in the classroom. Due to the unfortunate circumstance brought on by the Covid-19 pandemic, the program was unable to push forward with the adopting of the SRCL developed Literacy Plan. The program has prioritized this endeavor for upcoming performance report.

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
